



MICEFA SUMMER PROGRAM 2017 FAQ SHEET

How do I get from Charles de Gaulle airport to the Cité Universitaire ?

The most affordable option is to take the RER B train located in terminal 2 at Charles de Gaulle airport. This train is direct to the Cité Universitaire station. Once you arrive at the Cité Universitaire station, you will need to go to the group of building numbered 14 on the enclosed map. MICEFA has also provided your access information as well as airport transfer information. If you did not get these documents, please contact us immediately.

I will arrive in Paris before July 1st or leave after July 31st, can I stay at the Cité Universitaire?

Early arrivals will not be accepted at the Cite U in 2017. However, if you wish to extend your stay after July 31st, this may be possible. Please contact me as soon as you know your check out date.

Orientation meeting

Upon your arrival, you will meet with MICEFA staff who will provide you with your welcome materials and answer any questions you may have about the program.

I can not Check-in until 5pm but I arrive in Paris very early. Is there any way to check in earlier ?

No exceptions will be made. It will be a very long day and it is recommended to get lots of rest in the airplane. You may check-in with the MICEFA staff, leave your bags, then start to explore Paris. Or you can just hang out at the Cite U.

What kind of stuff should I bring to the Cité U?

Sheets and blankets will be provided with your rooms. Your sheets will be changed every two weeks. On the day of sheet change, you will need to remove your sheets and leave them in the hallway. If you do not remove your sheets, your sheets will not be changed. You will need to bring your own towels and a pair of flip-flops to go to the shower facilities. There are laundry facilities located in the main building of the Residence Honorat.

Where can I get a cell phone ?

If you do not have an international plan on your American cell phone, you can buy a pre-paid cell phone at one of the many cell phone provider stores (Bouyges, SFR, Orange, etc.). You buy a pay-as-you-go phone (around 25€), and then purchase pre-paid cards (*carte mobile*) to charge your phone credit as needed. This has been the more popular option among summer students. Card values are in the amounts of 5, 10, 25, 35 euros and more.

Can I have mail sent to me during my stay at Cité U?

Of course, mail boxes are located in the main building of the Residence Honorat (lower level near the laundry facilities). Any mail should be sent to the following address:

However, your stay at the residence is quite short and in international postage is long. You may reconsider having mail sent to you at the Residence.

Can we eat at the Cité U?

The rooms are equipped with a mini fridge. There is also a cafeteria and a restaurant on campus where you can have lunch or dinner for less than 5 € per meal. There are also common kitchens located in the dorms. Cooking utensils, pots and pan, etc. are not provided with your room.

Opening hours :

- Cafétaria *Monday to Friday 8 am - 7 pm*
Weekend 9:30 am – 7 pm, closed on national holidays
- Restaurant *Monday to Friday 11:45 am – 2:15 pm / 6:15 – 9 pm*
Closed weekends and holidays

What happens on July 29th ?

You will have to check out of the residence before 9am. Cite Universitaire's check out policy will be sent to you in mid-July.

Where can I buy groceries and how late are grocery stores open?

Some popular grocery store chains include: 8 à Huit, Franprix, Monoprix and Carrefour. Most stores are open Monday to Saturday 9am to 8pm. The majority of supermarkets are closed on Sundays however there are some open in the city center from 9am to noon.

How late does Paris transportation run?

Paris is the capital of public transportation, so take advantage! The Métro runs Monday-Thursday and Sunday from 5:30am to 1:15am, and Friday-Saturday from 5:30am to 2:15am. Arrive at the station approx. 30 minutes before closing, as last trains depart at different times depending on the station. You can always check the Métro, RER, Tram and Bus schedules online at the RATP website: www.ratp.fr. There is also a great little book called Paris Pratique, which includes all of the transportation and streets of Paris by district. You can purchase this little treasure at most newspaper stands or bookstores. Parisians swear by it!

What do I do if I have a medical emergency?

Call a MICEFA staff member, your professor or the main office at the Residence Honnorat right away. You will be provided the MICEFA emergency contact information in your Welcome Packet. If it is not an emergency, but you still need medical attention, you can find medical information in your Welcome Packet as well.

Pharmacies

Pharmacies in France are pretty similar to the US, except in France you can go to the pharmacy for medication and sometimes medical attention. Pharmacists have more medical training in France, so often you may go into any pharmacy and ask for medical attention. Common cold medicine may not be purchased at local grocery stores in France, unlike in the States. Most pharmacies are open until 8pm, if you need a 24h pharmacy you may look up a "pharmacie de garde" in your district online.

Air Conditioning in France

Air conditioning or "la clime" in French, is far and between, so do not expect most places to be equipped with AC. You'll find movie theatres, grocery stores museums and large department stores air conditioned, whereas the Métro, RER and elsewhere lacking this luxury. So make sure to bring a bottle of water with you, wear some sun block and comfortable clothes and walking shoes when you're out and about discovering Paris.
